

We will be a comprehensive institute, serving the workforce development and community needs of Tāmaki Makaurau | Auckland, from NZQCF Level 1 (certificate) to 10 (doctorate) across a broad spectrum of study areas.

2026 will be a formational year, standing up a new governing Council, Executive Leadership Team and an integrated approach to VET. The purpose of this document is to set the general direction around which Manukau Institute of Technology and United can unite. A more detailed Strategic Plan, including specific goals and timelines, will be developed in 2026.



Hononga Mana | Powerful Partnerships

We exist to work in collaboration with our partners, helping them achieve their goals. Our partners start with our ākonga and kaimahi, and expand to include Auckland employers and communities, and national and international communities of relevance.

Ākonga Success

Our akonga will be equipped and supported to succeed, not just at the beginning of their careers, but as required throughout their working life. Our graduates will be greatly valued by employers and our communities for their skills, knowledges, critical thinking abilities and values. We are committed to equitable educational outcomes. We will create prioritised opportunities to achieve excellent educational outcomes for all. We recognise that there are groups of akonga that may require particular attention, for a variety of reasons, including Māori, Pacific, whaikaha, neurodiverse and refugee ākonga, and the Rainbow community. To that end, we will provide a range of dedicated akonga support services, cocreated by these communities, focused on achieving this goal. We will hold ourselves accountable for being responsive to akonga through such methods as Student Council representation, Net Promoter Score and "you said - we did".

People with Purpose

Education and training thrive when enabled by knowledgeable and highly skilled kaimahi from diverse perspectives who are empowered and passionate about their mahi. We have and will attract, develop and retain kaimahi of the highest calibre. Our team will work well in partnership with each other. We will respect and value the knowledge, skills and manaakitanga that our kaimahi bring to their mahi. This includes a commitment to kaimahi wellbeing and safety, professional development, diversity and equity, and reward strategies.

Partnership with Tāmaki Makaurau | Auckland

Tāmaki Makaurau | Auckland is a Smart City combining smart people with smart infrastructure to unlock potential. We will partner first and foremost with the Tāmaki Makaurau | Auckland communities we serve including mana whenua, employers, professional bodies, local government, schools, religious and community organisations. We will be accessible and engaging for partners to talk with us about their needs. Through effective partnerships, we will ensure our dynamic portfolio of educational programmes are responsive to their current and future workforce training needs. These partnerships will also help facilitate seamless access to education and work for our ākonga, with our graduates being ready for work, and work-ready.

Partnered Research

We will be leaders in applied research, Kaupapa Māori research and Pacific research, complementing curiosity with our ethics, knowledges, skills and networks. We work with industries, professions and communities to address real-world opportunities and gain insights, involving and training our ākonga to do the same. We recognise many of challenges facing out partners will benefit from multidisciplinary approaches. Where our capabilities align with nationally or internationally-funded research projects, we will bring our applied research expertise into partnerships with other investigators (e.g. at universities and other research institutions).



Comprehensive Provision

It should be easy for employers to engage with vocational education and training. As a genuine partner, we will work with employers to provide whole solutions to their training needs. Where appropriate, we will facilitate provision by other VET providers in those subjects and locations where we are unable to adequately respond ourselves.

International Attractiveness

Manukau Institute of Technology and Unitec operates at the highest international standards across its many areas of endeavour. Our organisational culture benefits richly from people understanding and appreciating the many cultures represented within our kaimahi and ākonga community. Domestic and International ākonga will appreciate a learning environment that reflects the diversity of Tāmaki Makaurau | Auckland.

International ākonga will be attracted to Manukau Institute of Technology and Unitec because of the quality of the learning experience. All ākonga will benefit from the national and international relevance and transferability of their learning outcomes. In a sustained period of constrained domestic funding, international revenue provides an opportunity to advance our aspirations.



Akoranga Kounga | Academic Excellence

We are a tertiary vocational education and training institution, offering the highest quality of learning and teaching.

Excellent Programmes

Our current and new programmes will fully align with standards set by Industry Skills Boards and other professional and regulatory bodies. We will consider unification of similar programmes at Manukau Institute of Technology and United on a case by case basis, considering market requirements and opportunities for efficient delivery. We will drive excellence through the scholarship of learning and teaching and innovative, research-based curriculum design. Ākonga will be assessed through real-world tasks and challenges that demonstrate the currency and practical application of knowledge and skills. These will include industry-based, project-based, and reflective activities that foster critical thinking. This commitment will be supported by a strong Quality Management Framework and a culture of continuous improvement and professional development.

Personalised and Accessible Learning

We will work to tailor educational pathways to reflect the prior learning, strengths, aspirations, wellbeing and circumstances of each ākonga. This will include empathetic and supportive kaimahi, adaptive technologies, individual learning plans, culturally-aligned support, and access to essential learning facilities and resources. Delivery will be flexible and integrated – offered on-campus, online, in-work, and through individual and peer-based learning – to best meet the diverse needs of ākonga and employers.

Human-Centredness and Artificial Intelligence (AI)

We will ensure our kaimahi and ākonga are prepared for a world that is inevitably being massively changed by the rapid advancement of Al across all areas of endeavour. Our ākonga will come to understand the nature of AI and the opportunities and risks it presents – particularly for their chosen areas of work. They will develop skills in how to work with Al ethically and constructively.

Our commitments to powerful partnerships and academic excellence will be enabled by simple, sustainable ways of working.

Simplicity

We will design Manukau Institute of Technology and United to be simple and easy to navigate for both ākonga and kaimahi. We will remove barriers to access, success, and productivity. This principle will guide our decisions on policies, processes, and systems.

Financial Viability and Evidence-Based Decisions

Our work is vital for Tāmaki Makaurau | Auckland. In order to achieve our immediate and longer-term goals we must be financially viable and build financial reserves that can improve akonga outcomes and enable essential innovations. Therefore, financial considerations will be a key component of decision making. Additionally, we need to ensure our decisions are guided by our values and based on the best possible evidence. As such, we place high value on robust data collection, analysis and transparency.

Technological Innovations

As an Institute of Technology, we will leverage innovative technologies to enhance learning and productivity. We will, directly or through our valued industry partnerships, ensure that our kaimahi and ākonga are exposed to technologies and human innovations that are at the forefront of the world of work through which they will progress.

Sustainability | Kaitiakitanga

We will prepare our graduates for a world in which there is shared responsibility for environmental sustainability, stewardship of cultural heritages and collective lifelong learning.
