

# WAETURE TUKIPŪ | GENERIC REGULATIONS

# **BACHELOR'S REGULATIONS**

To be read in conjunction with: Unitec's Academic Statute and associated Policies and Procedures and other relevant policies; and the relevant Programme Regulations.

In these regulations, the term "Programme Regulations" means the schedule to these *Generic Regulations* for each degree award containing the supplementary and specific regulations relating to that degree.

These regulations come into effect from Semester 1, 2019.

# Ngā Ture Hei Whakaurunga | Admission Requirements

To be admitted to the qualification of Bachelor's degree applicants must meet:

a. Unitec's English-language entry requirements.

AND

- b. Admission requirements under one of the following provisions:
  - i. general admission;

OR

ii. special admission;

OR

iii. discretionary admission.

AND

c. Any programme-specific admission requirements set out in the respective *Programme Regulations*.

AND

d. Any programme-specific selection criteria.

## Whakaurunga Whānui | General Admission

- a. Applicants must have:
  - a minimum of 42 NCEA credits at Level 3 or higher on the New Zealand Qualifications
     Framework, with:
    - a) 14 credits at Level 3 or higher in each of two subjects taken from an approved subject list, with;
    - b) a further 14 credits at Level 3 or higher taken from no more than two additional domains on the New Zealand Qualifications Framework, plus;
    - c) a minimum of 14 credits at Level 1 or higher in mathematics or pangarau on the New Zealand Qualifications Framework, plus;

d) a minimum of eight credits at Level 2 or higher in English or Te Reo Māori (a minimum of four in reading and four in writing);

OR

ii. at least three 'C' passes in the New Zealand University Bursaries Examinations;

iii. successful completion of Unitec's *Certificate in Foundation Studies (Whitinga)* (Level 3) with a relevant pathway, where appropriate;

OR

OR

iv. successful completion of the Certificate of University Preparation (Level 4);

v. successful completion of the *Certificate in Foundation Studies* (Level 4)

vi. equivalent.

# Whakaurunga Motuhake | Special Admission

Applicants must have:

- a. attained the age of 20 years on or before the first day of the semester in which study for the degree is to start; and have
- b. provided sufficient evidence of aptitude or appropriate work or other life experience that would indicate a successful outcome in the qualification.

# Whakaurunga Kōwhiringa | Discretionary Admission

- a. In exceptional cases, an applicant who does not meet the general admission requirements and who has not reached the age of 20 on or before the first day of the semester in which study for the degree is to start may apply for discretionary admission.
- b. In assessing whether to grant discretionary admission in exceptional cases, the primary focus will be on the applicant's level of preparedness for study at therequired level.

#### Whakaurunga Reo Pākehā | English Language Admission Requirements

- a. Applicants must have achieved a minimum standard of English as demonstrated by a minimum of eight credits at NCEA Level 2 in English (four in reading; four in writing).
- b. For English-language entry requirements for international students, please refer to Unitec's *Admission Requirement Procedure*.

# Paearu Kōwhiri Tukanga | Selection Criteria and Process

Any selection criteria will be specified in the Programme Regulations.

# Ngā Ture Hei Whakawhiwhi Tohu Mātauranga | Requirements for the Award of the Qualification

#### **Credits and courses**

- a. To be awarded a Bachelor's degree a student must have successfully completed the required total of credits and courses specified in the *Programme Regulations* for the degree, including the completion of all compulsory courses and any specified pre- and co-requisites.
- b. Unless otherwise specified in the *Programme Regulations* for the degree, students may be awarded credit through cross-credits.

#### **Honours Pass Awards**

A student will be eligible for an honours pass award from a four- or five-year Bachelor's degree if the student has:

- a. met the credit requirements set out in the Assessment, Moderation and Grades Policy;
   AND
- b. completed the degree within the time limits set out in these regulations;
- c. achieved a cumulative grade-point average (GPA) of 6.5 or higher in all Level 7 and 8 courses.

#### **Senior Scholar Award**

To be eligible for consideration to receive a Senior Scholar Award a student must have achieved:

a. a cumulative GPA of 8.0 or better across all degree courses for which they have been assessed in a degree programme;

AND

b. at least two-thirds of the total credits for the degree through enrolment in Unitec courses (that is, have achieved no more than one-third of the credits by cross-credits from another institution or by assessment of prior learning).

# **Progress**

- c. Except in exceptional circumstances, and as approved by the relevant Academic Authority, no student may enrol for more than 75 credits in any one semester or more than 45 credits in a summer semester.
- d. Except in exceptional circumstances, and as approved by the relevant Academic Authority, the maximum time for completion of a degree is ten years from the date of first enrolment.

# Tūkukitanga Whakamihi | Credit Recognition

- a. Subject to the provisions of the *Programme Regulations* for the degree, the relevant Academic Authority may award a student cross-credits in recognition of successful equivalent study, at the same or a higher level in the context of another programme.
- b. Credit recognition is achieved by the award of cross-credits. Credit recognition may be recognised by the granting of:
  - i. **specified credits**, where there is direct equivalence of the learning outcomes of a successfully-completed course and a course in the programme; or
  - ii. **unspecified credits**, where the previous study has taken place in a programme with a similar philosophy but there is no exact match in the programme's courses. Unspecified credits will be awarded at the discretion of, and at a level decided by, the relevant Academic Authority.

# Aromatawai Tomua | Assessment of Prior Learning (APL)

Unless otherwise specified in the *Programme Regulations*, prior learning can be assessed and recognised for all courses and graduate outcomes according to Unitec's *Assessment of Prior Learning Procedure*.

# **Waeture Aromatawai | Assessment Regulations**

#### Paparahi Aromatawai | Assessment basis

All assessment is standards-based, and may be achievement- or competency-based as specified in the *Programme Regulations* for the degree.

#### **Summative Assessment Work**

- a. Students will be notified of the due dates for all summative assessment work at the start of each course. No late work will be accepted for marking unless specified in the *Programme Regulations* for the degree.
- b. All students' summative assessment work will be graded as specified in the *Programme Regulations* for the degree.
- c. Unless otherwise stated in the *Programme Regulations* for the degree, no re-sits or resubmissions of work submitted by a student for summative assessment will be allowed.
- d. The maximum grade a student can receive for re-sits or re-submissions of summative assessment work is the minimum possible passing grade.

# **Ākoranga Taumata | Course grades**

Course grades are calculated by the mathematical aggregation of weighted summative assessment grades on the basis set out in the *Programme Regulations* for the degree.

# Paearu taumata | Grade criteria

Students may be awarded one of the following grades for a course as per the criteria described below.

Table 4: Grade criteria

Grade	Meaning	Criteria
CR	Credit Recognition	The student has applied for and been awarded a credit recognition from another qualification
CTG	Continuing	The course runs for more than one semester and the final summative assessment has not yet occurred. No credits earned.
DEF	Deferred	The student has approval to complete a course assessment beyond the schedule date. Unless an exception has been approved, any deferred grade remaining on a student's record beyond a duration equal to that of the original course will be changed to the grade to which the student would otherwise be entitled. No credits earned.
DNC	Did Not Complete	A student has either withdrawn after 75% of the scheduled course duration; or has not attempted a compulsory item of assessment within a course. No credits earned.
ES	Student Exchange	The student has completed an approved inter-institutional exchange and it is not appropriate for another grade to be awarded. No credits earned.
NGA	No Grade Associated	Course assessment and reporting of results is carried out by an external agency. No credits earned.
R	Restricted Pass	The student has been awarded a restricted pass subject to the relevant clause in this schedule. Credits earned.
W	Withdrawn	A student withdraws from a course after 10% of the course is completed and up to or at the 75% date of the course. No credits earned.
#	Estimated Grade	If any portion of summative assessment has been estimated, the final grade will be an estimated grade and recorded as such on the student's <i>Academic Record</i> .

## Aromatawai I roto I Te Reo Māori | Assessment in Te Reo Māori

All students have the right to submit any summative assessment task/item in Te Reo Māori; the process for doing so is detailed on the programme's Moodle™ pages and other course material.

Assessment using Te Reo Māori is governed by Unitec's Assessment in Te Reo Māori Procedure.

# Āhuatanga aromatawai motuhake | Special assessment circumstances

Students whose performance in a summative assessment is being affected by reasons/factors beyond their control may apply for Special Assessment Circumstances under the following conditions:

a. the student was unable to complete the summative assessment item;

OR

b. the student's ability to complete the summative assessment, including preparation and/or performance, was impaired;

OR

c. the student needs to request additional time to complete the summative assessment.

# Pāhi Rāhui | Restricted Passes

- a. The relevant Academic Authority may award a 'restricted pass' in a course which was narrowly failed and where there is ample evidence that marginal failure is compensated by good overall performance. The conditions that apply to a restricted pass shall be included in the *Programme Regulations* for the degree.
- b. A student may decline the award of a restricted pass by notifying the office of the Executive Faculty Dean in writing not later than 20 working days from mailing of the results.
- c. The relevant Academic Authority may, at its discretion, prevent a student from using a restricted pass to meet the pre-requisite requirements of another course.

#### Whakamātautau waeture | Examination regulations

All examinations in this programme are governed by Unitec's Examinations Regulations .

# Tono Pīra | Appeals

Students may appeal the decisions made under these regulations in accordance with the relevant section of the Assessment, Moderation, and Grades Policy.

# **Āhuatanga Tauwhirowhiro Ritenga | Transitional Arrangements**

- a. Where transitional arrangements or modified programmes of study apply these will be set out in the *Programme Regulations* for the degree.
- b. Where transitional arrangements do not exist or have expired in the *Programme Regulations* the student will be required to complete a modified programme of study as approved by the relevant Academic Authority.

# Whakaritenga Whānui | General Provisions

# Whakamāramatanga ā-kaupapa | Definition of Terms

In these regulations, unless the context otherwise requires, the following definitions shall apply:

- 'Affected' means influenced in some way. For time-constrained items such as tests,
  examinations, and presentations, this may include the inability to attend any or all of the
  assessment events, or diminished performance. For other items it may be the inability to meet
  deadlines, or diminished performance within deadlines.
- 'Factors beyond the control of the Student' means any circumstance or situation, which the student could not have reasonably prevented, including, but not limited to, sickness or injury to the student, or bereavement.
- 'Relevant Academic Authority' refers to an individual or role-holder, or in some cases a
  committee, who have been delegated the authority to decide within a specific circumstance. A
  schedule of the various relevant academic authority delegations is maintained by the
  Programme Action and Quality Committee.
